SKID Presentation

Stop Kids Impaired Driving

SKID is a traffic safety education program coordinated by SKID staff and local first responders. The program is designed to educate young people about the tragic consequences of impaired and distracted driving. It utilizes a multi-agency, community effort that relies on strong partnerships with local high schools, police, fire, air ambulance,

and other emergency services.

Last month the Corbett High School juniors and seniors were given a SKID presentation with a very stark reenactment of what happens when teens drive while impaired and distracted. The presentation was introduced by Tessi Adams, Oregon's 2017 Volunteer Fire Fighter of the Year and a CSD substitute bus driver. It took place outside, off the back sports fields. The program



scenario began with recordings from actual Corbett High School grads, followed by current student actors portraying them. The dialog included a group of friends at a party, their decision to leave, and the choice of who was going to drive. Unfortunately, the driver was impaired.

Two tarps were then pulled away to reveal two crashed cars with actors portraying injured passengers – one fatally. Multnomah County deputies then pulled up to the field, joined shortly by members of the Corbett Fire District #14 along with one of their fire trucks and an emergency vehicle, the Life Flight helicopter arrived, and eventually a hearse. At the conclusion of the presentation the Multnomah County coroner spoke to the students.

Hopefully the SKID presentation helped to impress upon the students the importance of their decisions, and the potential terrible consequences of bad decisions. To learn more about SKID, please visit <u>https://skidprogram.org</u>.

INFORMATION for PARENTS:

McKinney-Vento Act: Homeless Education Program

If your family lives in any of the following situations:

- In a shelter
- In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation
- In a car, park, abandoned building, or bus or train station
- Doubled up with other people due to loss of housing or economic hardship

Your school-age children may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act.

Your eligible children have the right to:

- Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is your preference.
 - If the school district believes that the school you select is not in the best interest of your children, then the district must provide you with a written explanation of its position and inform you of your right to appeal its decision.
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.

If you believe your children may be eligible, contact the local liaison to find out what services and supports may be available. There also may be supports available for your preschool-age children.
