CTE OPPORTUNITIES at CORBETT HIGH SCHOOL

As students graduate and leave our high school, they go in many directions. Our vision is to provide them with as many great options as possible. Rigorous academic preparation is an important part of that vision. Students who are well prepared academically have more options, whether it's university, the military, or technical training. An active Career Technical Education program (CTE) is an important part of that vision.

Our Senior Plus program and Internship program (both in their 4th year here) are two important components of CTE. Senior Plus places students at Mt. Hood Community College for half-day experiences to try out classes in a variety of areas. A high school student who is excellent at math might try a class in auto mechanics. A student who is especially interested in psychology might try one of the health profession classes. The possibilities are almost endless, and include: computer information systems, fisheries technology, welding technology, allied health, and automotive technology.

Our Internship program works in a similar way. Juniors and seniors who want to work in the community describe their plans in an essay to our Internship committee and, if approved, spend afternoons at their work sites. This year one student is working with a horse rescue organization. Another is working with a company which produces batteries for electric cars.



Outside of these two programs students pursue a variety of interests. Almost every afternoon here on campus, you'll find a group of students busily building this year's entrant for the *FIRST* Robotics competition (For Inspiration & Recognition of Science & Technology). The robotics team is, in turn, an extension of our Computer Science/Coding program (computing science principles, engineering, and robotics classes) which enrolls about 100 students. Whether it's 3-D animation, engineering, music, app development, medicine, visual design, or robotics, computer science is the engine that powers the technology and productivity. Computer science experience has

become an important part of student success in the workforce and is also a step in the right direction for the Mechatronics Program at MHCC. This is the study of electro-mechanical systems used in today's modern manufacturing settings, preparing students to work in a wide range of industries that utilize modern equipment including industrial robots, programmable logic controllers, and other mechanical systems.

For students interested in military service and the opportunities offered there, we coordinate visits from all of the military branches throughout the year during the high school lunch hour in the commons so they can share their information.

All of these things are pointed towards one goal - allowing our students to move into the world with great options.

ROBOTICS LABORATORY



The old chemistry lab in the high school gym building has slowly morphed over the past few years. Now informally, and affectionately, it has been dubbed the Corbett High School Robotics Laboratory. The lab houses Corbett High School's computer science, engineering, and robotics programs. In our classes offered, students use a variety of tools to create many incredible things. At our student's disposal, we have a lathe, tabletop drill press, tabletop band saw, soldering equipment, an oscilloscope, a variety of hand tools, a variety of small electronics parts,

microcontrollers, three 3-D printers, a class set of touchscreen laptops, and a CAD computer workstation. This equipment is used to fulfill classroom assignments as well as creating for self-enrichment.



- The development and coordination of plans for the implementation of programs under this chapter at the school;

and

• The administration of grants-in-aid for the professional development of teachers and classified district employees.

The Site Council's recommendations shall not interfere with the duties, responsibilities, and rights of a duly elected school district board.


SCHOOL MEDICATION REMINDER

Nurse Tammy Cooley would like to remind parents of medication guidelines. Here are key points:

- All medication must be brought to school by the parent and requires a signed parent authorization to administer.
- Prescription medication requires physician directions that include: medication name, dose, method of administration, time of day to be given at school, duration, reason for medication.
- All over the counter medications must be age appropriate for the student and follow manufacturers recommended dosing guidelines, otherwise requires a prescription.
- All medications must be in the most recent original container with an accurate label, and must not be expired.
- Tablets requiring cutting are to be cut by the parent or pharmacist before being brought to school.
- Liquid medication requires a dosage spoon/cup (available at your pharmacy)
- Medication that must be crushed requires a pill crusher (available at your pharmacy) and a substance to mix powder into must be provided by the parent.
- Students may not self-carry/administer medication unless we have written authorization.

EMERGENCY CLOSURES

When it is determined that weather or other conditions may affect normal school operation, beginning at approximately 5:30 am, telephone calls will be made and emails sent. Radio announcements will begin at about 6 am and be updated every half hour.



After receiving reports from various sources, the superintendent will make one of the following decisions: continue with a normal school day; impose a two-hour delay (HS would start at 3rd period of a normal day, and run on regular schedule from 3rd period on); exercise a complete school closure throughout the district; or, impose a closure involving specific buildings.

http://www.FlashAlert.net is a website where parents or patrons can self-register to receive our information directly as emails or cell phone text messages. There is no cost to recipients for this service. It has a test function when recipients register to confirm that the messages will get past their spam filters, and an annual opt-in renewal process for each recipient to keep the database current.

WHAT IS MULTNOMAH COUNTY WRAPAROUND?



Wraparound helps families who are on the Oregon Health Plan and enrolled in Health Share, work through complex challenges related to emotional, behavioral, medical, or substance abuse.

It's a team based model that works by building on family strengths, collaborating with community resources, and incorporating shared decision making.

Under the Wraparound umbrella there is Intensive Care Coordination which provides access to students/families who are seeking mental health services (early childhood to age 17) including: screening, referral, engagement, assessment, treatment, and transition in care.

The mental health services include supporting youth who are experiencing complex, severe, persistent behavioral health needs, experience barriers to accessing mental health services, and more.

REMINDER: CEF PROGRESS REPORTS DUE

All students who received a scholarship from the Corbett Education Foundation for the current academic year have a Progress Report due January 15, 2019. Completion of a Progress Report two times a year is one of the stipulations of having received a scholarship. The document template can be found via a link on the Corbett Education Foundation website. Place your cursor over the "Scholarships" tab; click the "Scholarship Application Process" section of the drop down menu; and scroll to Section C, "Progress Report/College Transcript" to find the blank form. Students do not need to pay for an "official" transcript from their college or university. A copy of the transcript they can access and print will suffice.

Don't delay. Set aside a few minutes of your winter break to complete this important task **BEFORE** you return to classes. The January 15th deadline will be here before you know it and electronic copies are not acceptable. Progress Reports must be sent via the US Postal Service or hand delivered to the school district office (which may be closed during winter break). Failure to meet the deadline will make you ineligible for a future award.

Should you have any questions about completing the Progress Report, please call the CEF office at 503-261-4252 and leave a message. We will return your call as soon as possible. Please remember to allow sufficient time for a response as the CEF office is not staffed during regular business hours and our volunteers will be away for two weeks to spend the holidays with families.
