NEXT SCHOOL BOARD MEETINGS

Special Board Meeting - April 2nd at 7 pm in the grade school cafeteria: Work session with Rob Saxton, open to the public & opportunity for public comment.

Since the release and presentation of Rob Saxton's report on March 7th, there have been questions about the District and School Board's response to the Rob Saxton report and recommendations. The School Board, District administration, and staff have been processing the information, calculations, and recommendations. While processing, questions and clarifications have come up which we wish to work through with Mr. Saxton before releasing public statements and positions on the report. The Corbett School District Budget Committee meeting(s) are scheduled in the MPB from 7-8 pm on Wednesdays as follows:

May 1st - review and approve proposed budget

May 8th - continued review and discussion, <u>if necessary</u> May 15th - continued review and discussion, <u>if necessary</u>

May 20th - Extended deadline to submit approved budget to TSCC, ORS 294.431(1), "thirty days before hearing".

TSCC = Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission of Multnomah County. TSCC protects and represents the public interest, ensures Multnomah County governments' compliance with Local Budget Law, promotes economy and efficiency within those local governments, and provides advice and assistance to them. *It is past and continuing practice for Corbett School District to submit its approved budget to TSCC.*

June 19th - Public hearing on the finished budget, before the regular school board meeting. The board will vote on the budget during their meeting which follows the public hearing.

The Corbett School District is facing many serious considerations. The public is encouraged to attend the budget meeting(s) to understand the serious challenges ahead.

SCHOOL MEDICATION REMINDER

Nurse Tammy Cooley would like to remind parents of medication guidelines. Here are key points:

- All medication must be brought to school by the parent and requires a signed parent authorization to administer.
- Prescription medication requires physician directions that include: medication name, dose, method of administration, time of day to be given at school, duration, reason for medication.
- All over the counter medications must be age appropriate for the student and follow manufacturers recommended dosing guidelines, otherwise requires a prescription.
- All medications must be in the most recent original container with an accurate label, and must not be expired.
- Tablets requiring cutting are to be cut by the parent or pharmacist before being brought to school.
- Liquid medication requires a dosage spoon/cup (available at your pharmacy)
- Medication that must be crushed requires a pill crusher (available at your pharmacy) and a substance to mix powder into must be provided by the parent.
- Students may not self-carry/administer medication unless we have written authorization.

The winner of the regional will go on to the national spelling bee in Washington, DC.





Diagnosis by Medical Provider	Attendance Guidelines	Special Precautions
Abscesses, Boils, Staph Skin Infections	Keep out of school – if open draining wounds	May attend if affected areas can be kept completely covered with a bandage. No contact sports until lesions are healed. No food service duties while lesions present.
Chicken Pox (Varicella)	Keep out of school – until all skin lesions are crusted or resolved, and no new lesions are developing	Notify exposed pregnant or immune- compromised individuals to contact their provider with questions or concerns
Cough – severe or lasting over 2 weeks	Keep out of school – until assessed for possible pertussis by provider	Student may return when symptom-free or with consent to return from provider to school nurse
Fever	Keep out of school if fever $\geq 100.5^\circ F$	OK to return after 24hrs fever-free withou the use of fever-reducing medication
Fifth Disease	OK to attend	Notify exposed pregnant or immune- compromised individuals to contact their provider with questions or concerns
Hand Foot & Mouth	OK to attend if no open, draining lesions, or drooling	Encourage excellent hand hygiene
Head Lice	OK to attend but parent should be notified and given instructions on how to remove lice and nits before returning student to school	Encourage continuing parent head checks for lice; educate student to avoid head to head contact with others
Impetigo	Keep Out of School until 24 hours of antibiotic treatment are completed	May attend if affected areas can be kept completely covered with a bandage. No contact sports until lesions are healed. No food service duties while lesions present.
Meningitis, suspected or proven (stiff neck or headache with fever	Keep out of school if bacterial, until at least 24 hours of antibiotic treatment. If viral, ok to attend school. Notify nurse consultant if bacterial.	Viral meningitis is rarely spread in schools. If bacterial, nurse consultant will assist school to notify students/staff of potential exposure.
MRSA	Ok to attend if affected skin areas can be completely covered during the school day	No contact sports until lesions healed. No food service duties while lesions present.
Pinworm	Keep out of school for pre-school only	May return the day after first treatment. Encourage excellent hand hygiene.
Pink Eye (conjunctivitis)	Ok to attend - Almost all pink eye is viral conjunctivitis, which is self-limited and does NOT require antibiotic eye drops or ointment	Encourage excellent hand hygiene, keep hands away from face, and no sharing of personal items
Rash due to reportable condition (e.g., measles, rubella)	Follow Oregon Public Health Investigative Guidelines, unless instructed otherwise by Health Officer. Notify nurse consultant.	Nurse consultant will work with school to notify students/staff of potential exposure
Rash with or without fever – new/sudden onset	Keep out of school until rash resolves or student sees their provider in person for diagnosis and clearance to return	Once cleared, any open/affected areas of skin should be covered during school day
Ringworm	OK to attend if affected skin areas can be completely covered during school day	No contact sports until lesions are healed or no longer draining
Scabies	Keep Out of School - until treated	Student may need 2nd treatment.
Shingles	Keep Out of School – until all skin lesions are crusted or resolved. May attend if affected areas can be kept completely covered during the school day.	No contact sports until lesions healed. No food service duties while lesions present.
Strep Pharyngitis	Keep Out of School – until 24 hours of antibiotic treatment are completed and fever resolved	No food service while ill
Tuberculosis (TB)	OK to attend – a positive TB skin test alone does not mean individual is infectious. Notify nurse consultant .	Nurse consultant will work with public health dept. and school admin. regarding any individuals with contagious TB
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SCHOOL EXCLUSION RECOMMENDATIONS FOR COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Students should not attend school if they have complaints that prevent them from active participation in usual school activities, or if they require more care and monitoring than the school can safely provide, per ODE Guidelines for Exclusion (as described in OAR 581-022-0705).
