CORBETT SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETING(S)

The Corbett School District Budget Committee meeting(s) are scheduled in the MPB from 7-8 pm on Wednesdays as follows:

May 1st - review and approve proposed budget
or

May 8th - continued review and discussion, if necessary
May 15th - continued review and discussion, if necessary

May 20th - Extended deadline to submit approved budget to TSCC, ORS 294.431(1), "thirty days before hearing".

TSCC = Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission of Multnomah County. TSCC protects and represents the public interest, ensures Multnomah County governments' compliance with Local Budget Law, promotes economy and efficiency within those local governments, and provides advice and assistance to them. *It is past and continuing practice for Corbett School District to submit its approved budget to TSCC.*

June 19th - Public hearing on the finished budget, before the regular school board meeting. The board will vote on the budget during their meeting which follows the public hearing.

The Corbett School District is facing many serious considerations. The public is encouraged to attend the budget meeting(s) to understand the serious challenges ahead.

NEXT YEAR'S 8/9 ACADEMY

The secondary staff members on the main campus are excited to share an important change in grade configuration. Beginning next year, we will create an 8/9 Academy in order to accomplish these five goals:

- Improve 9th grade on-track to graduate rate.
- Prioritize the transition from middle school to high school, as this transition is the biggest predictor of on time graduation.
- Create smaller student cohorts to help build stronger relationships between students, staff, and parents.
- Create smaller teaching teams to promote professional learning and improve student outcomes.
- Reduce the number of students in the most inadequate facility on campus, the middle school.

We know there will be lots of questions about the particulars of the change. Two parent meetings were held last month, along with principal chats at CAPS and the main campus with Principal Phil Pearson and Vice-Principal Kathy Childress, and a community presentation at the April school board meeting. Future meetings will be scheduled as well. We invite all parents in grades K-12, but especially parents of middle school age students, to attend one of several future meetings as they are scheduled to present information, collect feedback, and plan for next year.

Although we can not answer all your questions in this article, here is a short list of FAQ's:

1. Will the 8/9 Academy be multi-age? Yes. Students will spend two years in the academy in mixed age classrooms like they do in the other grades on main campus.
2. Will 8th grade students receive high school credit? No. Students who are in 8th grade will not receive high school credit except for 8th grade students who are in pre-calculus or higher. One of the goals of this change is to help 8th grade students make the transition to high school level expectations without the immediate consequences of transcriptable grades that students face in our current system.
3. Where will the Academy be housed? The Academy will be located in the current high school building, but the Academy will operate on a different schedule than the high school. For instance students in the Academy will start their day in the cafeteria for a short morning meeting, their passing periods will be different than the high schools students, they will be located in their own wing of the building for their core classes, and they will have a separate lunch than the high school students. In every way possible we are working to create a separate Academy that shares a building with the high school.
4. What about CAPS students? CAPS middle school teachers will be attending the same trainings for human geography and environmental science so they can integrate this curriculum in their classrooms. The goal is to provide equivalent curricular instruction at CAPS so an 8th grade student from CAPS can transition as a 9th grade student without a deficit in instruction.
5. What if a CAPS 8th grader wanted to transition early? Just like any grade level, parents are free to apply to move their student from one campus to the other at the end of each year. The application process has worked smoothly for 7 years and we have never denied a request to move.

We know there will be more questions such as ones about dances, sports, grades, schedules, etc. Parents will have the opportunity to hear a more detailed description of the academy and have an opportunity to ask questions so the FAQ can be updated. We hope you can join us at future meetings as they are scheduled.

VISIONS and VALUES COMMITTEE

The Corbett School District is moving forward with the Visions and Values committee. In total, about 50 applications were received from resident parents, non-resident parents, and community members who will bring a set of diverse opinions to the process. Selection was made by a committee of three board members. The initial meeting is scheduled for Monday, May 6th.

The Visions and Values committee will serve as an Advisory Committee to the Corbett School District, and will guide the process and serve to put together a Vision and Values document. This document will be presented to the board for consideration and potential adoption. Prior to adoption by the board, broad community support will need to be evident. Periodic reports and surveys will be conducted to involve the broader community in the process. Ultimately, the board has the authority to modify committee recommendations if deemed appropriate.

DISTRACTED DRIVING EDUCATION for CORBETT HIGH SCHOOL



Thanks to the coordination efforts of School Safety Officer Deputy Cortada, the Corbett High School students had access to ODOT's "Distracted Driving Trailer" for two full days last month. It presented the real-life story of Alexxyss Therwhanger, age 19, who was killed in a car crash on February 19, 2016 while she was driving home in eastern Oregon. Alexxyss was using her cell phone and lost control of her car, colliding with an oncoming vehicle and severely injuring two other people. Alexxyss' crashed car was enclosed in the trailer to spread awareness about distracted driving. Here is a portion of the information presented:

"At about 3 pm Alexxyss left a friend's house in Long Creek, Oregon, driving towards her home in Kennewick, WA. Within 3 minutes of leaving she began to send and receive text messages on her cell phone. The area in which Lexi was traveling had limited coverage, yet anytime Lexi was in a service area she began to send and receive text messages. While traveling Hwy. 395, she also began to view and share messages on her social media account. Between 3 pm and 3:45 pm, Lexi sent or received 14 text messages, liked three Facebook posts, and shared one post. Lexi shared her last Facebook post at 3:54 pm. That was the last contact she would ever have with family and friends. Just minutes later she failed to negotiate a slight curve in the roadway. Lexi's attention was diverted just long enough to cause her to leave the road, overcorrect, cross into the other lane, and get T-boned by an oncoming car."

In addition to the "Distracted Driving Trailer", high school teacher Mrs. Radulesk brought in guest speaker Tiana Tozer, who had another personal story to share with students. She was also in a car accident in her youth and was severely injured. She played on the USA para-olympic basketball team for five years and now works for ODOT talking to kids about the dangers of distracted driving.

These presentations coincided with the lead up to the high school prom, with the hope of impressing upon students the importance of safe driving practices. It is part of the district's ongoing efforts to educate young drivers. Earlier in the school year the SKID (Stop Kids Impaired Driving) presentation was brought to the high school juniors and seniors. It is a traffic safety education program coordinated by SKID staff and local first responders.

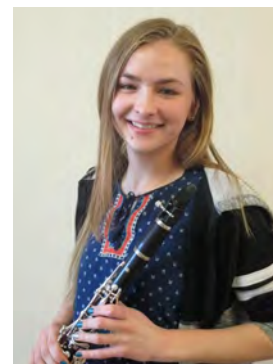

CORBETT STUDENTS COMPETE in the OREGON BATTLE of the BOOKS PROGRAM



Corbett Grade School and CAPS participated in the Oregon Battle Book program for the first time this year. The Battle of the Books program is sponsored by the Oregon Association of School Libraries whose goal is to “encourage and recognize students who enjoy reading, to broaden reading interests, to increase reading comprehension, promote academic excellence, and to promote cooperative learning and teamwork among

students.” The organizers estimate that 7,600 teams and 36,000 kids within Oregon participated in the program this year. The competition is divided into three divisions: elementary (grades 3-5), middle school (6-8 grade), and high school (grades 9-12). There are 16 books selected for each division that the teams of students read and are quizzed on during the competition.

Twenty-five students in five teams participated in the Battle of the Books at Corbett Grade School. The students met 1-2 times a week from November to early March with the District’s Media Specialist, Lisa Just. Abby Steichen coordinated the Battle of the Books program at CAPS. At the grade school, a double-elimination tournament was held, and The Page Turner team made up of Claire Cook, Ella Houston, Shayla Mazer, and Olivia Young came out on top to represent the school at the regional competition held at Creston Elementary School on March 16. Caps had a team at the regional competition as well.



At the regional competition, 21 schools competed. The team from Corbett Grade School made it past the first two rounds of to competition to advance to the “Elite Eight” group but lost to a very tough team from Sweetbriar Elementary. Duniway Elementary from Portland Public Schools won the regional competition and went on to the state competition held April 6 in Salem at Chemeketa Community College. At the elementary level, James John Elementary from Portland Public Schools won the state competition.
