### **MEET OUR NEW SPARROW MIA!**

Two weeks ago the students of Corbett got to meet their 2019-20 Sparrow, Mia, and her mom. They both attended an assembly in the main gym hosted by Laura Queen, the Portland Program Director of Sparrow Clubs, USA. Mia is a fun loving 9 year old who loves dancing, gymnastics, painting, and drawing. She also loves popcorn, spaghetti, pizza, mac 'n cheese, YouTube videos, baby dolls, and Barbies. Mia definitely has a flair for fashion and an eye for bright colors.

Sparrow Clubs USA is an organization that not only provides financial and emotional support for children and their families in medical need, but also empowers kids (elementary to college age) to help others through charitable service in their communities. Mia is generously sponsored by Iron Eagle Trailers and the Columbia Gorge Helping Hands Food Salvage Program.

The Sparrow Clubs program teaches life lessons in compassion and selflessness through building relationships between a Sparrow family, a school student body, and our community. Sick kids get help, healthy kids become heroes, and communities experience change.

When Mia was 7 ½ months old she was diagnosed with the meningitis B virus, a life threatening bacterial infection that attacks the brain, spinal cord, and bloodstream. She spent over 111 days in the hospital where doctors worked diligently to save her life. The infection was so severe it caused the tissue on many parts of her body to be badly damaged. Doctors performed three separate surgeries to amputate both legs as well as multiple skin grafts on her body.

Mia has endured over 150 surgeries and has worked hard through all types of therapies to learn to adjust and grow stronger. She has been fitted for eight sets of prosthetic legs As she continues to grow, she will require more surgeries and procedures.

Through all of this, Mia continues to be happy and positive and is an inspiration to all. Mia has been adopted as a Sparrow to Corbett High School. This means that students will work hard to not only love and support her, but raise money for Mia through community service and fundraising for special therapy and equipment along with medical and daily expenses. Corbett is so excited to have Mia joining our community!

## Your child's regular attendance in school encourages academic and social-emotional success. Together, families, educators, and community members can support a child's attendance and help each student stay on the path to success.

It doesn't matter whether the absences are excused or unexcused -- each missed day represents missed learning time. Missed days add up quickly: When a student misses as few as 1.5 days a month, that's 10% of the school year. This increases the risk of academic and social-emotional struggles.

About 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  absences a month = 14 days of missed school in a school year. That's missing almost a month of school!
