FROM INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT DAN WOLD...

Good news! Our reopening plans received the support of the School Board at their February 17th meeting, and those plans have been submitted to the Oregon Department of Education and to our Local Public Health Authority. That means, as long as the metrics continue to allow, we can begin Hybrid Instruction once the staff has had an opportunity at immunization, which is Wednesday, March 10. We will start with Grades K-2 at CAPS and Grades K-1 at the Grade School, then add grades as we are successful with the program. Of course, any families who choose to remain receiving their education through Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL) can do so.



Hybrid Instruction is a blend of in-person, on-campus learning and virtual learning. A team of stakeholders designed how this could best be accomplished at each site. Building leaders will be sending out information about how this will look at each of their schools, and the complete plan is posted on our website.

"Fall" school sports have started! Sadly for our community, spectators will not be allowed at contests, but we are working on plans to live stream as much as we can. Go Cardinals!

Round 1: District Standards for Admitting Non-Resident Students to Corbett Charter School District

Deadline Midnight on March 2nd

Resident district students are automatically admitted and do not need to apply for admission.

Corbett School District is accepting out-of-district students commensurate with state law regarding charter lotteries. Corbett School District will not deny consent for a student to enter or give priority for admission based on race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, ethnicity, national origin, disability, terms of an individualized education program, income level, proficiency in the English language, or athletic ability.

Applications began to be accepted on the district website on February 10th, and will be accepted until midnight on March 2nd. The drawing will be Monday, March 8th. A lottery, should it be needed, will take place after the close of the application process. The district will create an ordered list of applicant names based on the fair and equitable lottery process. Applicants who are selected to attend Corbett School District via the lottery process will have 10 days from the date of notification to confirm their intention to attend Corbett School District during the 2021-2022 school year. If confirmation is not received within those 10 days their space will be forfeit and the next person on the list will be notified that they have been admitted to the Corbett School District.

Corbett will be admitting the following numbers of students in the following grade levels.

Kindergarten - 36 students accepted

Gr. 2 - 13 students accepted

Gr. 5 - 4 students accepted

Gr. 7 - 3 students accepted




From the Health Room:



We are preparing for when more students will be back to school in-person. The Oregon Health Authority has written “What to expect when your student returns to school ”... (A special thank you to Debbie Baker, Health Assistant for finding this information.)

Across Oregon, some schools are starting to reopen. If your student is returning to school, you may be worried or hopeful or both. For students who return to the classroom, some things will look different. Here are some new health and safety routines to know about:

Staggered arrival and dismissal times: This cuts down on crowding in hallways and common spaces. Your student may be assigned to a particular entrance and exit. There might be stricter sign-in/out processes to make contact tracing easier.

How you can help: Schools are asking caregivers to keep drop-offs and pick-ups as brief as possible.

Face coverings: Students from kindergarten up must wear a face covering indoors and outdoors, as well as on the school bus.

How you can help: Make sure young students can get their masks on and off without help. Wash masks daily. If you can, pack a spare mask in your student’s backpack.

Outdoor learning: Some lessons may happen outside when weather allows.

How you can help: Pack extra layers; make sure your student has rain gear.

Meals at school: Students may be asked to eat outdoors or in classrooms instead of in the cafeteria. School meals will not be self-service or buffet-style.

How you can help: Young students often struggle to open containers. If your student brings a packed lunch, make sure they can open all their food and drink so that they don’t have to ask for help.

DIVERSE VOICES & ACHIEVEMENTS

March is Women's History Month.

Kamala Harris, Vice President of the United States. Vice President Harris is the United States' first female vice president, the highest-ranking female elected official in U.S. history, the first African American vice president, and the first Asian American vice president.



Malala Yousafzai, an activist for female education. In 2012, at age fifteen, an attempt was made on Ms. Yousafzai's life because she spoke out publicly in her town in Pakistan on behalf of girls and their right to learn. At age seventeen she became the youngest Nobel Prize Laureate. In 2020 Ms. Yousafzai graduated from Oxford University and continues to fight for education and equality.




Suzan Shown Harjo, a leading Native American activist. Ms. Harjo has contributed to development and passage of federal legislation protecting Native sovereignty, arts and cultures, language, and human rights. In 2014 she was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Obama.



Mother Teresa, an activist for the poor. During her lifetime Mother Teresa became famous as the Catholic nun who dedicated her life to caring for the destitute and dying in the slums of Calcutta and started an open-air school for slum children. In 1979 she received the Nobel Peace Prize. After her death in 1997, at age 87, she was canonised as Saint Teresa.



MARCH CELEBRATIONS:



March 10: Harriet Tubman Day, an American holiday in honor of the anti-slavery activist Harriet Tubman (born Araminta Ross). Despite great hardship and great danger, Ms. Tubman undertook 19 trips as a conductor in the Underground Railroad to lead hundreds of slaves to freedom. She later became an eloquent and effective speaker on behalf of the movement to abolish slavery. She also served in the Civil War as a soldier, spy, and nurse, among other roles. She died on March 10, 1913.

March 21: International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, observed annually in the wake of the 1960 killing of 69 people at a demonstration against apartheid pass laws in South Africa. The United Nations proclaimed the day in 1966 and called on the international community to redouble its efforts to eliminate all forms of racial discrimination.



March 31: International Transgender Day of Visibility, celebrated to bring awareness to transgender people and their identities as well as recognize those who helped fight for rights for transgender people.

CHILD FIND

Public schools will ensure that all students with disabilities who are eligible for kindergarten through 21 years of age, residing within their attendance area, have available to them a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment. The rights of children with disabilities and their parents will be protected in accordance with state and federal laws.

School districts must locate and identify individuals who have disabilities from birth to age 21. If you or someone you know has a child with a disability who may be in need of special education and related services, you can initiate a referral through your local schools.
