FROM INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT DAN WOLD...

It has been very nice to greet our youngest students back to campus, and we look forward to adding the rest of the grade levels in the next few weeks. The state requirement that we start small and "step in" to more and more students on campus seemed cumbersome and unnecessary at first, but the benefits are now becoming apparent as we observe, learn, and modify our plans and procedures for both increased safety and efficiency. Our reopening plans for CAPS, CGS, and CMS were all in line with Governor Brown's recent directives, but we are modifying our plan for the high school students. We truly appreciate your patience as we work through these ever-changing protocols and requirements.



Plans for relocating the middle school and district offices are progressing. The architects have created draft plans that seem to meet our minimum needs within our budget, and the Woodard site has been prepared for county inspections regarding wastewater and storm runoff. The bond is scheduled for sale on April 15. We are still optimistic about moving into the remodeled facility in August of 2022.

FROM MRS. DAWKINS, GRADE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Over a year ago we sent our students home to learn at home, while we navigated life during a global pandemic. On March 10th, a year to the day that we sent kids home, Corbett Grade School joyfully welcomed back our K/1 students for on-site learning. Our teachers were very excited to be back to in-person learning and this week we greeted our 2/3 kids to their first week back.

Having our students back on-site means fewer students in a classroom each day, everyone wearing face coverings as they learn together, and a lot of handwashing and sanitizing. Being on-site almost means teachers can teach more effectively, students have more engagement with their peers, and parents are excited to get their kids back into their classrooms.

During this past year, we appreciate the dedication our parents, students, and staff have shown during a difficult time. All was not lost, both teachers and their students learned a lot more about technology. Kids also learned how to follow a schedule and how to become a bit more independent. Now that we are back it is lovely to see kids reading books, painting pictures, thinking about math problems, and laughing together.

After spring break, Corbett Grade School will welcome all K-5 students back to on-site instruction for two days and off-site for two days. Cohort A students will join us on Mondays and Tuesdays. Cohort B will be on-site on Wednesday and Thursdays. Our day is slightly shorter, 8:30 am until 2:15 pm. Please be aware of our parking lot and traffic changes for morning arrivals and afternoon departures.

OSU PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The OSU Presidential Scholarship Award pool of recipients was very impressive with an average unweighted/weighted GPA of a 3.985 and 4.17, respectively. Additionally, around 19% of recipients are first generation students which is a huge increase from last year's 4%!

The students from Corbett High School who have been selected for the Presidential Scholarship are (drumroll, please): Eligh Aron and Ryan Bunnell!

These students will receive \$40,000 (\$10,000 per year, renewable for up to four years total) toward OSU educational expenses. Those committing to OSU will also have their Advanced Tuition Deposit (ATD) waived along with other perks that can be found at: https://admissions.oregonstate.edu/presidential-perks

As a reminder, the Presidential Scholarship will replace the Finley Academic Excellence Scholarship students were previously awarded. Any scholarships awarded through ScholarDollars are stackable with the Presidential Scholarship and students will be notified of those awards separately.


CORBETT HAS HEART!





CHILD FIND

Public schools will ensure that all students with disabilities who are eligible for kindergarten through 21 years of age, residing within their attendance area, have available to them a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment. The rights of children with disabilities and their parents will be protected in accordance with state and federal laws.

School districts must locate and identify individuals who have disabilities from birth to age 21. If you or someone you know has a child with a disability who may be in need of special education and related services, you can initiate a referral through your local schools.
