THANK YOU COLUMBIA GRANGE #267 and CORBETT STUDENTS for EQUITY!

The Corbett School District would like to extend a huge thank you to Columbia Grange #267 and to the Corbett Students for Equity for their extremely generous donation of \$819.83 to the Corbett School District. This money is to be used specifically for the purpose of purchasing equity materials. The first book selected is the NY Times #1 bestseller, *Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood*, by Trevor Noah. Multiple copies have been purchased to share among high school students.

In early September 2020, Columbia Grange members agreed to sponsor Anti-Racism Training in response to the Black Lives Matter movement. They worked with several community members and Corbett High School students to identify and hire trainers for what was called "Engaging the Moment: Courageous Conversations about Race, Justice, and Equity." Session One on September 28 focused on establishing and understanding the foundations of racism, race, and anti-racism. Session Two on October 26 focused on moving from understanding to allyship, advocacy, and action. The workshops were well-attended and included Corbett School District staff and students, Grange members, and other members of the Corbett community.

The workshops were funded by anonymous local donors and were offered free to participants with the option of making a donation. After paying the presenters, the Grange was pleased to offer the balance of \$819.83 to Corbett Students for Equity. The Corbett Students for Equity asked that the money be donated to the Corbett School District, to be earmarked for purchasing equity materials.

We appreciate this help in supporting our students and staff in this very important issue!



ECO OUTDOOR VISIT

For our celebration of Earth Day, we had an outdoor visit from our educational partner Ecology in the Classroom Outdoors (ECO). Our K-5 kids investigated what makes up our soil. WAMO! That is how we remember that soil consists of: water, air, minerals, and organisms. We spent time learning how the combination of these four things changes what type of soil is found around us. Julie and Alexandra had some amazing microscopes that helped us safely see up close what exactly was in the soil. Learning about the earth and nature helps us better understand the place we live, and develops our curiosity to learn more.

SENIOR YEAR in GERMANY!



Corbett High School junior Naomi Cassel was awarded the <u>Congress-Bundestag</u> <u>Youth Exchange Scholarship</u> for a full academic year abroad (her senior year). She hopes to use this experience to support her goals of studying linguistics and neuroscience in her undergraduate studies, and to strengthen her cross-cultural empathy through a full language and cultural immersion program abroad. The CBYX High School Program is a jointly funded and managed full-scholarship program by the U.S. and German governments that offers students the opportunity to spend a full academic year studying abroad. This program is for motivated high school students who want to experience a culture first-hand and learn a language through a full immersion experience.

As a student in the CBYX High School Program next year, like every CBYX student, Naomi will be a Citizen Diplomat and will be living with a host family and attending a German high school for the duration of the program. Because the program is managed through four different, well-established, international exchange organizations that manage different regions of the U.S. (ASSE, AFS, CIEE, and YFU; Oregon CBYX applicants are managed by ASSE) there are no actual statistics since every region is managed by a different organization. However, this is a very competitive national scholarship and only 250 students are selected from around the country. When asked about her upcoming year, Naomi said, "I am most excited about learning a new language and a new culture. I have always loved language learning and I want to study linguistics and neuroscience in my undergraduate studies, and so I look forward to completely experiencing a different culture, language, and host community in Germany. I am also very excited to meet new people and make connections with a new community in a meaningful, authentic way. And no…if you were wondering, I *don't* speak German... but I am very excited to learn the language :)."

If you're interested in taking a leap of faith into a completely new world in Germany, apply! For those interested, you must be a U.S. citizen, be ages 15 -18 ½ on August 1st of your departure year, be a current high school student at the time of application and have a 2.5 GPA on a scale of 4.0, an interest in learning the German language (no previous experience necessary), and comply with U.S. Department of State eligibility policy for American Outbound Youth Programs (more info on that <u>here</u>). If you're a motivated, mature, student with the ability to represent the U.S. with distinction, and have a motivation for a cross-cultural experience, including a tolerance for adversity, then I would apply for the CBYX program!

The CBYX Program is also always looking for families to host German exchange students, so if you don't feel comfortable spending a whole year abroad in Germany but want to get involved in the program, you can apply to be a host family! (More info on that <u>here</u>.)

If you are interested in applying, here is what the application process looks like:

- **September:** Applications open for the CBYX Program! If you would like to be notified when the application opens, <u>fill out this interest form</u>
- **December:** Applications are due
- January -- April: Selection process
- March May: Selection announcements
- July September: Group international departures from the U.S.
- June -- July (the following year): Group international return to the U.S.

My application process looked like:

- September December: Initial application:
 - Personal information, contact information, family information, your activities, awards, and interests
 - Grade level, classes taken, cumulative GPA
 - 5 supplemental essays (250 400 words each)
 - Media release, congressional Information, and statistical information
 - Dear Host Family letter, original school transcripts (and academic certification if applicable)
 - Signed CBYX terms and conditions
 - Two teacher recommendations
- Late December: Notified of Semi-Finalist Status
- Late January -- March 1: Semi-finalist application:
 - Revised Dear Host Family letter, certificate of health, photo collage, and a signed application form
 - Questions about lifestyle, allergies, medications, etc; for more information for host family placement
 - Interview with my parents and area representative
 - Group interview with a panel of CBYX alumni and other applicants
 - Individual interview with panel of CBYX alumni

• Late March: Notified of Finalist Status and that I received the CBYX scholarship for the 2021-2022 school year

DIVERSE VOICES, EVENTS, & ACHIEVEMENTS

May is <u>Asian-American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month</u> in the United States. The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the <u>first Japanese to the U.S. on May 7, 1843</u>, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. <u>The majority of the workers who laid the tracks on the project were Chinese immigrants.</u> <u>Click here to visit the Smithsonian Asian Pacific American Center.</u>

May is also <u>Mental Health Awareness Month</u> which aims to raise awareness and educate the public about mental illnesses and reduce the stigma that surrounds mental illnesses.

May 5 - <u>Cinco de Mayo</u> is a Mexican holiday in remembrance of the Battle of Puebla in 1862, when Mexican troops defeated French forces. It is not Mexico's independence day, and is really only celebrated in the Mexican state of Puebla. In the U.S. we celebrate Mexican culture and heritage on this day.

May 10, 1994 - <u>Nelson Mandela</u>, a former political prisoner, was inaugurated on this date as president of South Africa. In 1962 he was arrested and subsequently sentenced to life imprisonment for conspiring to overthrow the state. Mandela served 27 years in prison. In 1994 he won the first free election in South Africa and became its president, despite attempts by political foes to deter the outcome. In 1999 he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize recognizing his work in the peaceful termination of the apartheid regime, and for laying the foundations for a new democratic South Africa.

May 17, 1954 - <u>Brown vs. Board of Education</u>, on this date the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that segregation of public schools "solely on the basis of race" denies black children "equal educational opportunity" even though "physical facilities and other 'tangible' factors may have been equal. Separate educational facilities are inherently unequal." Thurgood Marshall argued the case. He went on to become the first African American appointed to the Supreme Court.

May 28, 1887 - <u>Jim Thorpe</u>, of the Sac and Fox Nation, was born on this day. He is perhaps the greatest multi-sport athlete. Descended from the Chippewa warrior **Black Hawk**, he was the first Native American to win an Olympic gold medal, and won two at the 1912 Olympics. Both were taken away because he'd once been paid to play minor-league baseball, a violation of Olympic rules. The <u>International Olympic Committee restored them in 1982</u>. After the Olympics, Thorpe played professional football, baseball, and basketball, appeared in 70 films, and has a town named after him: Jim Thorpe, Pennsylvania.

From the Health Room:

The sun is shining brightly and the blue sky surrounds the campus. A beautiful Spring day has arrived in Corbett. Happy voices of students eating lunch outside are a wonderful sound to hear on the school grounds again. Watching students train for cross country and having school picture day feels like a *normal* day.

As we head towards a late spring and your children are outside more, I thought it would be helpful to print the CDC guidelines on preventing injuries in children. For those who have students that are learning to drive, reviewing basic traffic and car safety is important.

Steps you can take to prevent leading causes of child injury include:

Burns • Install and maintain smoke alarms in your home. • Develop and practice a family fire escape plan. • Set your water heater's thermostat to 120 degrees Fahrenheit or lower. • Use safe cooking practices, such as never leaving food unattended on the stove. Drownings • Install a four-sided isolation fence, with self-closing and self-latching gates, around backyard swimming pools. • Wear life jackets in and around natural bodies of water. • Learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and get recertified every two years. • Supervise young children at all times around bathtubs, swimming pools, and natural bodies of water. Falls • Use playground equipment that is properly designed and maintained, and that has a soft landing surface material below. • Use home safety devices, such as guards on windows that are located above ground-level, stair gates, and guard rails. • Wear protective gear when playing active sports, such as wrist guards, knee and elbow pads, and helmets when in-line skating. • Supervise young children at all times around fall hazards, like stairs and playground equipment. **Poisonings** • Store medicines and other toxic products such as cleaning solutions in locked or childproof cabinets. • Put the poison control number, 1-800-222-1222, on or near every home telephone. • Follow directions on the label when giving medicines to children. Read all warning labels. • Dispose of unused, unneeded, or expired prescription drugs. Road traffic injuries • Use appropriate child safety seats. • If you have a teenage driver, sign an agreement in order to limit risky driving, such as having multiple passengers and driving at night. • Transport children in the back seat of your vehicle. • Make sure children wear motorcycle and bicycle helmets. www.cdc.gov/safechild



More than **3.6 million** U.S. youth are using e-cigarettes

How much do you know about this crisis?

Youth use of e-cigarettes, also known as vaping, remains a public health crisis. E-cigarettes are the most commonly used tobacco product among both middle and high school students.⁹ Compared to 2019, 1.8 million fewer U.S. youth are currently using e-cigarettes. However, due to alarming increases since 2011, the number of current youth e-cigarette users remains concerningly high.¹

SOME TEENS REPORT USING E-CIGARETTES IN SCHOOL BATHROOMS AND EVEN IN THE CLASSROOM.²

Learning more about the different types of e-cigarette products is an important first step in addressing youth vaping.

DID YOU KNOW:

E-cigarettes come in a variety of shapes and sizes and may not look like a tobacco product, which can make them hard to spot.²

Some devices popular among teens — like Juul and Puff Bar — are as small as a USB flash drive and even look like one.^{2,16}

Certain products emit very low amounts of aerosol or "vapor," which makes them easier to use discreetly than combustible cigarettes.^{9,11}

Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, the same highly addictive drug in cigarettes. Some e-cigarettes⁵ may contain as much nicotine as a pack of 20 regular cigarettes.³


How to Talk to Kids About Vaping Risks

Use this guide to start an honest conversation at home about e-cigarettes and addiction.

A t school, through a program developed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and Scholastic, your child is learning why e-cigarette use—sometimes called vaping—isn't safe for tweens and teens. The problem is real, and youth vaping remains a public health



crisis. Today, about 1 in 20 middle school students currently use e-cigarettes, and the majority of kids have seen them used at school. Many kids think vaping is harmless, but it can have serious health consequences. Share these facts and tips with your child to help them stay safe.





Practice Ways to Say No

Ask your child if they've ever felt pressure to try vaping. Then strategize what they can say or do if another kid offers them an e-cigarette, and have them practice by responding to different situations.

- Say a simple "No, thanks," or "Nah, that's not my thing."
- Change the topic ("Hey, are you going to band practice today?").
- Walk away and do something else.
- Talk with a friend, parent, or trusted adult.



Healthy Habits at Home

The environment in your home plays a big role in your child's decisions. Keep it healthy to help kids avoid harmful habits.

 If you smoke or vape, try quitting. Teens report that one of the top reasons they try e-cigarettes is that a friend



or family member uses them. Share the reasons why you want to quit, and ask your family for their support as you start your journey.

- Establish a tobacco-free home. Don't allow smoking or vaping in your home. Make sure to ban smoking and vaping in your car too.
- Steer clear of smoking and vaping in public places. Avoid restaurants, parks, and other locations that allow people to smoke or vape.
- Set family health goals each week. Take a walk together around the neighborhood, try a new vegetable each week at dinner, do one-minute yoga stretches together, or challenge everyone to drink more water. Working as a team keeps it fun!

Resources

Teens may not know the signs of nicotine addiction. If you think your child is vaping, talk to them about why it is harmful. Ask for support from others. Remember: It's never too late to get help.

Signs of Addiction

- Cravings to use e-cigarettes or other tobacco products
- Feeling anxious or irritable
- Continuing to vape despite negative consequences
- Going out of one's way to get e-cigarettes
