FROM INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT DAN WOLD...

Progress continues on the plans and preparations for the remodeling at the Woodard site for relocation of the middle school and district headquarters in the fall of 2022. There have been many hurdles, but our Crackerjack oversight team of Steve Salisbury, Bob Buttke, Todd Redfern, and Michelle Vo have worked diligently to keep us on schedule and on budget. The Bond Oversight Committee met again, on May 18, to look at progress and spending to date.



Many of you may have seen our new Middle School/CAPS principal, Rachel Goodloomis, around the district already. Though her contract begins in July, she is already visiting the sites, sitting in on planning meetings, and getting to know folks. If you see her out and about, please say hello and introduce yourself. This year, two of our three principals, our business manager, and our superintendent were all new in their positions. Thank you for the patience and support you have shown us; I am confident you will do the same for Mrs. Goodloomis!

To date, we have received little updated guidance from the state about how we can expect to conduct school in the fall. All of the leadership team here in Corbett, and most school leaders with whom we have spoken, are planning on an all-students, every-day model in the fall, though there may still be some restrictions on common areas and activities. The Oregon Department of Education has said they will "release final guidance" July 22.

When it comes to trying to understand why all of the guidance does not align, not only between states, counties, and departments thereof, but also between schools (especially in regards to athletic events), we "feel your pain." Why do we have to mask and distance in our community classrooms, but we can wrestle students from other communities unmasked? Why have they modified or dropped masking requirements in three of our four bordering states, but not here? And on and on. We do not have the answers to all of these questions, and we know that in itself adds to your frustration. We can tell you that, for the safety of our staff, students, and families, we are committed to following the guidance/requirements given us, and trying to keep up with the changes to the best of our abilities.

1) What has changed the most at Corbett since Kindergarten in 2008?

Gates are only opened when school starts to get in and at the end of the day when it's time to leave. Students can no longer leave the school property at any point throughout the day unless excused from a legal guardian. Corbett also has security monitoring the property throughout the school day which helps make students feel safer.

2) What is your favorite memory from your Corbett years?

My favorite memory is when I was in grade school. They would take kids to the gym every year I think and they would show us birds; owls, eagles, and hawks. They weren't pictures, these people brought real live birds and taught us about them. There would also be times where they let the birds fly over us to get to the other target across the gym. Me being an animal person, I always waited for that time to come.

3) What teacher has impacted you the most from Corbett?

The teacher that has impacted me the most would have to be Mrs. Duprey. Mrs. Duprey gave out the "you can do it, I believe in you" energy. 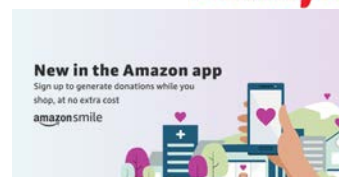

CORBETT GRADE SCHOOL NEWS

We continue to love being on-site and learning with so many of our K-5 students. While we have had many challenges this school year, we have also become better with technology, have developed more independence and confidence, and learned how much we all enjoy being together at school.

During the past few weeks our K/1 kids have been learning about the geology of the Columbia River Gorge. They created ice dam simulations to see what happens when the dams break. The goal was to create a dam that would hold water. They quickly learned that this was a bit more difficult than they anticipated.



In addition, the K/1 kids have created time capsules to be opened when they graduate in 2032 and 2033. Each student created a drawing and sentence about what was good and what was bad about life during a pandemic. They were also interviewed by an adult about their likes

and favorite things such as places to be, family activities, foods, music, and more. We also place a signed face covering in our time capsule as an artifact of our past school year.

Our 2/3 classrooms have been learning about the Indigenous People of the Columbia River Gorge. Students have explored local tribes' connection to the natural world by studying traditional cultural practices and ways in which they have utilized the resources around them to meet their most basic needs. They got to hear from local historian Clara Gorman via a Zoom visit. She shared about her work with local tribes of the Pacific Northwest and the Library of Congress. Students were able to see artifacts that she has studied and ask her great questions about her work and extensive knowledge about our area's Indigenous People.



Our 4/5 students were challenged to work like past geologists: to persevere, pay attention to detail, and take careful notes to help uncover the mystery of how huge floods changed the landscape of the Columbia River Gorge.

Students learned through science stations to understand the age of the earth and its processes such as plate tectonics, the magnetic field, and rock identification. Our young geologists then investigated the land up close - as past geologists did. They looked at the evidence of composition, shape, and placement of earth and water in the Scabland region. They compared what they learned about landform creation over time (flooding, rivers and valleys, glaciers, rock placement) with evidence of these things once existing in the Scablands - by using observational thinking and studying vocabulary.

Satisfactory performance and perfect attendance will allow a student to recover 1/2 credit of science. Field trip days may be a little longer. June 14th-17th, June 21st-24th, 9am-2:30 pm OR August 2nd-5th, August 8th-12th, 9am-2:30 pm.

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2021 8/9 ACADEMY & HIGH SCHOOL SUMMER ENRICHMENT *(continued...)*

Incomplete Plan/Gradpoint Camp: This will be a structured, teacher-supported space for students to work on their incomplete plans, or finish a Gradpoint course. Students may stop attending when they finish their courses. This will be offered June 14th-June 17th, and June 21st-24th, 9:00 am to 2:30 pm.

Algebra 1 Skills: This will be an opportunity to gain and develop algebra skills for students who struggled with algebra this school year OR would like to get a head start on Algebra for the 21-22 school year. Credit will be earned through proficiency for 10th-11th graders, as determined by the instructor. The course will meet once a week on Mondays, from 9:00-11:00 am, June 14-August 9th, with no class on July 5th.

NW History and Language Arts: A two-week credit recovery course for English and Social Studies. Proficiency-based credit of up to 1/3 of a credit in both English and Social Studies. Topics will include NW history, writing, reading, speaking, and include at least one field trip. Some out of class work will be expected. August 2nd-5th, and Aug 8th-12th, 9:00-2:30 pm.

Band Camp: Dates to be determined, but most likely in August. Time and location also to be determined. This could be for credit recovery in band, but also for fun!

Strings Camp: Aug 9th-12th, 9:00 am-2:30 pm. Mr. Blaeuer will be holding a summer strings camp for all Corbett incoming 8th-12th grade violin, viola, cello, and bass players this August. In addition to rehearsal sessions and group sectionals, on the last day the group will be going on a nearby field trip to perform. Sheet music and snacks will be provided, along with bus transportation to and from the school for practices and the field trip. Outdoor School Leadership Camp: A 4-day leadership program for rising sophomores, juniors, and seniors focused on skill development, career connected learning related to natural resources and education. Program incentives (\$150 stipend for students), transportation, and PCC credit are included. 8 weeks to choose from. Great opportunity for any student looking to develop leadership skills, learn about outdoor education. Students interested in elective credit recovery at Corbett High School will need to write an additional paper.

Two-Day Outdoor School for rising 7th and 8th graders: 2-day summer program based at one of MESD's Outdoor School programs for middle school (next year's 8th graders) students who may have missed the Outdoor School experience. Students will engage with natural spaces to participate in activities connected to Next Generation Science Standards and Social and Emotional learning. Dates to be determined.

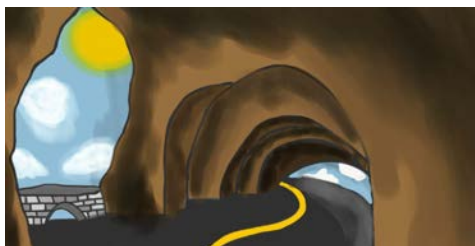

About the project

ODOT and project partners are breaking ground on a long awaited segment of the Historic Columbia River Highway State Trail: the Mitchell Point Tunnel.

DIVERSE VOICES, EVENTS, & ACHIEVEMENTS

June is LGBTQ Pride Month. [Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer \(LGBTQ\) Pride Month](#) is currently celebrated each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally. On June 15, 2020, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the historic 1964 Civil Rights Act protects LGBTQ employees from discrimination in the workplace, giving a major victory to the LGBTQ civil rights movement. June 26th is the anniversary of Legalization of Same-Sex Marriage in the U.S.



June 11: [Anne Frank Day](#) - Anne was a German-Dutch girl of Jewish heritage. One of the most discussed victims of the Holocaust, she gained fame posthumously with the 1947 publication of *The Diary of a Young Girl*, her diary in which she documents her life in hiding from 1942 to 1944, during the German occupation of the Netherlands in World War II. In October 1944, Anne and her family were discovered. She and her sister, Margot, were transferred from Auschwitz to Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, where they died a few months later. Anne's diary is one of the world's best-known books.



June 15: [Native American Citizenship Day](#), commemorates the day in 1924 when the U.S. Congress passed legislation recognizing the citizenship of Native Americans. The Indian Citizenship Act still didn't offer full protection of voting rights to Native Americans. As late as 1948, two states (Arizona and New Mexico) had laws that barred many from voting. Native Americans faced some of the same barriers as Blacks, including Jim Crow-like tactics and poll taxes, until the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1965.



June 19: [Juneteenth](#), is also known as Freedom Day or Emancipation Day. This celebration honors the day in 1865 when slaves in Texas and Louisiana finally heard they were free, two months after the end of the Civil War. June 19, therefore, became the day of emancipation for thousands of African-Americans. Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free.



STUDENT SUCCESS ACT

In 2019 the Oregon Legislature passed the Student Success Act (SSA). This law provides new funding to Oregon schools. One component of the law is the Student Investment Account (SIA) which distributes funds directly to Oregon school districts through non-competitive grants. During the 2019-20 school year we conducted various community outreach and engagement activities to determine our spending priorities for these funds. We identified four priority areas:

- Increase student access to counselors and mental health professionals.
- Address individual student needs through strategic class size or caseload reduction.
- Address Middle School safety issues.
- Broaden curricular options especially CTE(Career & Technical Education) at the high school.

Last summer Corbett School District's SIA grant application was approved. Our original allocation for the 2020-21 school year was \$927,557. Due to the economic downturn related to COVID-19 our share was reduced to \$293,519. This reduction did not allow us to carry out all the activities we had planned, but it did fund the following activities:

- Fund a full-time counselor serving students in grades K-7 (K-8 CAPS).
- Retain one classroom teacher at grades K-1 to maintain an average class size of 25 or lower.
- Fund one CTE position at the high school.

For the 2021-22 school year Corbett's preliminary allocation of SIA funds is \$749,927. Another piece of good news is that our community passed a general obligation bond measure to fund the renovation of the Woodard property in order to relocate the Middle School program. We had originally planned to spend about one-third of the yearly SIA allocation on this project. Since we do not need to use SIA money for the renovation we are able to add some of the other top priorities, as generated by the school community, to the 2021-22 plan.

We are updating the grant application and plan to include the following activities:

- **Increase student access to counselors and mental health professionals.**
 - Continue to fund one full-time counselor to serve students at the Grade School, Middle School and CAPS.
 - Fund an additional .5 FTE dedicated to counseling services in grades 8-12 (totaling a full-time counselor for the 8/9 academy and High School).
- **Address individual student needs through strategic class size or caseload reduction.**
 - Continue to fund one classroom teacher at grades K-1 to maintain an average class size of 25 or lower.
 - Fund an additional full-time special education teacher to serve students at the Middle School.
 - Increase FTE dedicated to English Language Development services from .5 to 1.0 to serve students K-12.
 - Increase FTE dedicated to intervention services from .5 to 1.0 to serve students at the Grade School and Middle School.
 - Hire an additional three para-educators to increase one-on-one and small group instruction at the Grade School, CAPS, and Middle School.
- **Broaden curricular options especially CTE(Career & Technical Education) at the high school.**
 - Continue to fund 1.0 FTE CTE position at the high school.

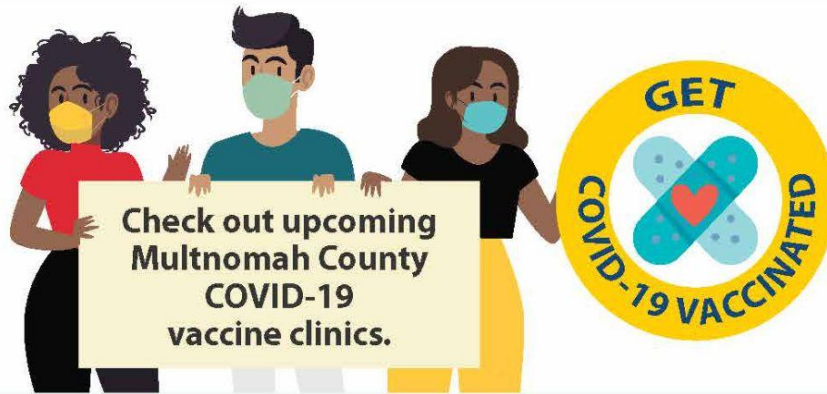
