FROM INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT DAN WOLD...

It is so nice to be underway full-time and in-person (as of this writing). We have had some additional challenges related to the pandemic, but so far, thanks to our dedicated staff, parents, and board, we are moving forward and getting back into the routines. Our student and staff population totals roughly 1,200 people; as of this writing we have had eleven COVID-positive cases, or just under 1%. Our health authority, Multnomah County Health Department, has also quarantined 47 people, or about 4% of our population, due to exposure to six of these COVID-positive



individuals (the other five were kept home and there were no exposures). I want to give a huge "shout out" to our nursing staff and our administrative assistants; they have put in long and hectic days keeping up with the mandatory tracking, communicating, and reporting involved.

Guidance is changing frequently, but for now all students, staff, and visitors are required to wear face coverings indoors, and outdoors if congregating. The mandate reads:

"All individuals 5 years of age and older to wear a face covering outdoors when individuals cannot or do not consistently maintain at least 6 feet of physical distance from people not in their household."

This applies to students, staff, and visitors, including spectators at athletic events. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we navigate these frequent changes.

Plans for the remodeling and construction at the Woodard site continue, with design 50% complete. There are several layers of permits, variances, and approvals to work through, and that process is ongoing. Recent initial cost estimates came in higher than anticipated, but still within our total bond amount. If there are no more unexpected delays, the timeline still allows for a Fall 2022 move-in.



PROOF of COVID IMMUNIZATION STATUS

Dear Corbett School District staff, substitutes, coaches, contractors, and volunteers,

The district is collecting proof of vaccination and immunization status to comply with Governor Brown's directive legally requiring all K-12 school district staff, substitutes, contractors, coaches, and volunteers to become fully vaccinated against COVID-19 by October 18, 2021.

Corbett School District staff members: Please provide a copy of your vaccination card or exception request form (<u>religious</u> or <u>medical</u>) to Robin Lindeen-Blakeley in the district office, either in person or via email <u>rlindeen@corbett.k12.or.us</u> by October 5th.

Substitutes: All active CTA substitutes should have received an email from CTA Substitute Services (<u>not</u> the Corbet School District) regarding CTA's process for collecting vaccination cards as well as applications for religious or medical exceptions. On October 18, 2021, CTA will be deactivating any substitutes who have not submitted proof of being fully vaccinated or have an approved exception. If you have questions contact CTA Substitute Services.

Coaches & Athletic Support: Please provide a copy of your vaccination card or exception request form (<u>religious</u> or <u>medical</u>) to Angela Davis, either in person or via email <u>adavis@corbett.k12.or.us</u> by October 5th.

Volunteers (individuals & school organizations) & Contractors: Please provide a copy of your vaccination card or exception request form (religious or medical) to Nancy Gyerko, either in person or via email ngyerko@corbett.k12.or.us no later than two weeks prior to the event for which you are volunteering or contracting. As a volunteer or contractor, you will submit to Nancy at the same time a Criminal History Verification form with Confidentiality Statement agreement, and COVID Waiver of Liability form. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) recently issued <u>OAR 333-019-1030</u> that applies to staff, substitutes, contractors, coaches, and volunteers in all schools and school-based programs. As with state executive branch employees and health care workers, religious and medical exceptions may apply. OHA also released some helpful <u>frequently asked questions</u>.





Vaccination is free and available to all Multnomah County residents ages 12–19, regardless of immigration or insurance status. Youth ages 12–14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian or have a signed consent form.



This fall, Corbett School District will again ask parents/guardians, staff, and students in **grades 3-12** to complete the YouthTruth Survey. This partnership is a result of the Student Investment Account(SIA) process that began the 2019-2020 school year. This tool helps us to gather ongoing feedback from our school community regarding what we are doing well and what we can improve. The YouthTruth Student Survey is a nationally recognized survey used in hundreds of schools and districts across the country, surveying hundreds of thousands of students. All the surveys are anonymous and individual ratings are not identified in any reports because results are shared at the group level.

The Student Survey asks students about their experiences in the school and with their teachers, including how engaged they are at school, the rigor of their coursework, and their preparedness for the future.

The Family Survey gives parents/guardians the opportunity to provide feedback to their child's school in areas such as culture, engagement, relationships, communication & feedback, school safety, and resources.

The Staff Survey gives school-based staff members the opportunity to provide feedback about their experience as staff members in areas such as culture, relationships, engagement, professional development & support, and school safety.


The survey window is from October 4 to 29. The link to the Family Survey will be emailed the first week of October. Parents will receive more information regarding the Student Survey from their child's teacher before the survey is administered. Although we want to hear from as many students, families and staff as possible, **participation is voluntary**.

The Student Survey is available in English, Spanish, and Russian. The Family Survey is available in English, Spanish, Russian, Vietnamese, Korean, Mandarin, Portuguese, and French. The language is selected from a dropdown menu at the beginning of the survey.

Parents who do not want their child to participate in the student survey should contact the classroom teacher.

DIVERSE VOICES, EVENTS, & ACHIEVEMENTS

October is Filipino American History Month. Filipino Americans are the second largest Asian American group in the nation. This month honors their history, accomplishments, and legacy. The celebration commemorates the first recorded presence of Filipinos in the continental U.S. on Oct. 18, 1587.



Filipino Americans have played an important role in social justice movements from the United Farmworkers Movement and the American Indian Movement, to civil rights, voting rights, and Black Lives Matter.

October 5, 1877 - Chief Joseph of the Nez Perce Indians surrendered on this date to the U.S. Cavalry troops at Bear's Paw, Montana. "From where the sun now stands, I will fight no more forever," he declared. Earlier in the year, the U.S. government broke a land treaty with the Nez Perce, forcing the group out of their homeland in the Wallowa Valley region of Oregon, for relocation in Idaho. In the midst of their journey, Chief Joseph learned that three young Nez Perce warriors had killed a band of white settlers. Fearing retaliation by the U.S. Army, the chief began one of the great retreats in American military history.



For more than three months, Chief Joseph led fewer than 300 Nez Perce Indians toward the Canadian border. The Nez Perce outmaneuvered and battled more than 2,000 pursuing U.S. soldiers. During the long retreat, he treated prisoners humanely and won the admiration of whites by purchasing supplies along the way rather than stealing them. Finally, only 40 miles short of his Canadian goal, Chief Joseph was cornered by the U.S. Army, and his people were forcibly relocated to a barren reservation in Indian Territory.

October 11: National Coming Out Day. For those who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender, this day celebrates coming out and the recognition of the 1987 march on Washington for gay and lesbian equality. National Coming Out Day continues to raise awareness for individuals within the LGBTQ+ community, and champion the idea that homophobia thrives in silence. On this day, many people who identify as LGBTQ+ will "come out" (a term stemming from the phrase "come out of the closet") to friends or family about their sexuality, which is a very big moment. On this day the history of the LGBTQ+ movement and its champions are honored.



October 11: The second Monday in October, typically marked as the federal holiday of Columbus Day, is also recognized as Indigenous Peoples Day. Because the two holidays share a calendar date, it is possible to celebrate both.

When Columbus Day is celebrated without acknowledging the complicated history surrounding it, a distorted view of events



can get presented. This can cause Native Americans and those of indigenous heritage to feel as if both the achievements and the sufferings endured by their ancestors don't have a place in the story of America. Indigenous Peoples Day is in no way meant to detract from recognizing Italian-Americans or their impact on our society. Rather, it serves as a celebration of all peoples and cultures that contribute to the vibrant tapestry of the shared American story.

GRADE SCHOOL NEWS

It has been so nice to have our students back for in person, full time instruction. We have mastered the morning drop off and we continue to improve with dismissal. Please remember that K/1 students end their day at 3:35pm and 2/3 and 4/5 classrooms dismiss at 3:40pm. Please try to arrive close to your child's dismissal time and not before.

Our K/1 classrooms will be learning about the life cycle of salmon and will continue to writers of narrative stories. They have made a lot of progress on learning the routines and making it through the long days!

The 2/3 classrooms are working on building strong reading habits. They will begin to practice phonetic-based spelling words, handwriting, grammar, and hopefully some word processing skills. In Gorge Studies, they will begin the year studying economics for second and third graders! The students will work on budgeting in a pretend world that their teachers will set up. We will also study the different types of businesses that are in our local area and the types of businesses which helped Corbett grow into a community years ago.

4/5 students are learning about birds found in our area, building their reading stamina, and writing stories. Our 4/5 students are setting a good example for our younger students. They are also able to choose between band, strings, or general music. You can often find this group out on the soccer field or under a tree reading a good book!

All Corbett Grade School teachers will be inviting their families to meet to talk about their students and how best to help them move forward throughout the school year.

2021-22 Annual Notice for Statewide Tests

ALL STUDENTS GRADUATE PREPARED

In 2010, Oregon adopted higher K-12 standards in English Language Arts and Math to ensure all students move from grade to grade with the academic knowledge and skills necessary for success beyond high school. Because we raised the bar for what we expect students to know and be able to do, we have also changed the way we measure student progress through our state tests, known as Smarter Balanced.

Why does participation matter?

While no single test can give a complete picture of your child's progress, statewide tests provide educators and administrators with information about what educational approaches are working and where additional resources are needed. Your child's participation is important to ensure schools and districts receive the targeted resources they need to help all students succeed.

Description of rights

Oregon law (ORS 329.479) permits parents and adult students to annually opt-out of Oregon's statewide summative tests in English Language Arts and Math by submitting a form to the school the student attends. Schools will provide parents with the 2021-22 form at least 30 days prior to the start of testing.

STATEWIDE TESTING WINDOWS

English Language Arts & Math Tests Grades 3-8: March 8—June 3, 2022 Grades 9-12: January 11—June 3, 2022

OREGON'S STATE TESTS

- Challenge your child to think critically and apply their knowledge to real-world problems
- Go beyond multiple choice and ask your child to explain their answers
- Act as a snapshot of your child's progress and may be considered along with other pieces of information to determine your child's academic success
- Help identify schools and districts that need additional supports to ensure more students are meeting higher standards

When will my child take the test?

Your child will be tested once after they have completed at least two-thirds of the school year. Your child's school will determine the specific dates your child takes the tests within the statewide testing window.



FREE LUNCH ALL SCHOOL YEAR

Due to COVID-19, the USDA has released waivers effective for the entire 2021-22 school year. This means the Corbett School District will serve free meals to all students, age 18 years and under.



As a result, there is no need to complete a Free & Reduced Lunch application for student meals. However, we still encourage families to complete an application. Approval can qualify students for significantly reduced school sport rates and reduced fees for some community programs (you may need to provide a copy of your award letter to qualify).

The school district receives additional federal funding based on how many students have applied and qualified for free and reduced meals — so if you fill out a form and qualify, you are helping both your family and your school!





CHILD FIND

Public schools will ensure that all students with disabilities who are eligible for kindergarten through 21 years of age, residing within their attendance area, have available to them a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment. The rights of children with disabilities and their parents will be protected in accordance with state and federal laws.

School districts must locate and identify individuals who have disabilities from birth to age 21. If you or someone you know has a child with a disability who may be in need of special education and related services, you can initiate a referral through your local schools.


