FROM INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT DAN WOLD...

We recently had a situation where we had law enforcement dealing with suspected criminal activity in our community and we secured the campuses. This was a precautionary measure, and our students were not directly threatened. Whenever we are notified by law enforcement that there is a suspect at large within our boundaries, we make staff aware, secure the perimeter of our buildings, and keep students indoors. Education activities otherwise continue as normal. Relative to other area school districts, these situations happen rarely here in Corbett, but we treat each occurrence seriously, and debrief afterwards as a leadership team regarding what went well and where we can improve. By the way, I was attending the International School Safety Conference, learning the latest in best practices, when this latest event occured...

INCLEMENT WEATHER ANNOUNCEMENTS



When it is determined that weather or other conditions may affect normal school operation, beginning at approximately 5:30 am, telephone calls will be made and emails sent. Radio announcements will begin at about 6 am and be updated every half hour.

Notification of any emergency which could lead to a closure, or change to virtual learning, must be directed to the superintendent. He will then decide if the emergency procedure is warranted and should be initiated.

After receiving reports from various sources, the superintendent will make one of the following decisions: continue with a normal school day; impose a two-hour delay (HS would go to homeroom and then the day would proceed as normal, 2nd period on); pivot to virtual learning; exercise a complete school closure throughout the district; or, impose a closure involving specific buildings.

http://www.FlashAlert.net is a website where parents or patrons can self-register to receive our information directly as emails or cell phone text messages. There is no cost to recipients for this service. It has a test function when recipients register to confirm that the messages will get past their spam filters, and an annual opt-in renewal process for each recipient to keep the database current.

Manufacturing at Corbett



FIRST Robotics Competition

Once again, students from Corbett High School are planning on participating in the global FIRST Robotics Competition. This is the main focus of the high school's Industrial Control and Design Class. Students have spent this past trimester learning the ins and outs of both small and industrial scale automation processes: pneumatic actuation,



computer programming and control, power and power distribution, computer aided design, and manufacturing techniques. This year's competition theme is Rapid React. Corbett is among many teams from around the world excited and looking forward to in-person competition once again this year. Competing in the FIRST Robotics Competition is a costly, but worthwhile endeavor. Students learn business and marketing skills as they are responsible for fundraising and managing finances for the team. DIVERSE VOICES, EVENTS, & ACHIEVEMENTS



Aceia Spade, a senior at Churchill High School in Eugene, Oregon, was named National Miss Juneteenth by the Washington Post. Spade received a college scholarship and will spend the year representing Juneteenth Oregon and the National Juneteenth Observance Foundation, as well as spreading Juneteenth awareness locally and nationally.

Aceia Spade will meet later this month with Oregon Gov. Kate Brown to discuss ways to educate more Oregonians about the holiday, according to Juneteenth Oregon.



<u>December 1st is Rosa Parks Day.</u> Mrs. Parks was an American activist in the civil rights movement best known for her pivotal role in the Montgomery bus boycott. The U.S. Congress has called her "the first lady of civil rights" and "the mother of the freedom movement".

On December 1, 1955, in Montgomery, Alabama, Mrs. Parks, a seamstress at a local department store, rejected a bus driver's order to relinquish her seat to a white passenger. After her arrest for civil disobedience in violating

Alabama segregation laws, the black community boycotted the Montgomery buses for over a year. A federal Montgomery bus lawsuit resulted in a decision that bus segregation is unconstitutional under the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.



Fresh Paint, a partnership between Open Signal and the Regional Arts & Culture Council, provides emerging artists of color with a paid opportunity to paint a public mural for the first time in Portland. The latest temporary mural was created by <u>Jose Ruiz Valentine</u>, a 20-year old Portland artist who graduated from Rosemary Anderson High School in 2019. The mural design reflects Valentine's Chicano history and culture. The colorful design depicting a serpent and catholic imagery is titled *Venerated Mother*.



December 10th is International Human Rights Day. On December 10, 1948, the U.N. General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, a milestone document proclaiming the inalienable rights which everyone is inherently entitled to as a human being regardless of race, color, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Available in over 500 languages, according to Guinness World Records it is the most translated document in the world.





This has been a very busy season for the Health Room and we have enjoyed getting to connect with many of our families and students. I am amazed at the resiliency and how each family is working hard to keep the community healthy.

The cold, wet weather is now here and I can personally attest just how strong the east wind can blow!

Many of our students will be enjoying playing in the snow soon. Layering your student's clothing and using some of the CDC guidance is an easy way to prevent hypothermia and frostbite.

The CDC advices:

- a scarf or knit
- mask that covers face & mouth
- mittens or gloves
- water-resistant boots

- a hat
- a water-resistant coat
- several layers of loose-fitting clothing

The CDC further recommends that: "When going outside in winter make sure body parts most often affected by frostbite are covered in warm, dry clothing."



INFORMATION for PARENTS

McKinney-Vento Act: Homeless Education Program

If your family lives in any of the following situations:

- In a shelter
- In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation
- In a car, park, abandoned building, or bus or train station
- Doubled up with other people due to loss of housing or economic hardship

Your school-age children may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act.

Your eligible children have the right to:

- Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is your preference.
 - ➤ If the school district believes that the school you select is not in the best interest of your children, then the district must provide you with a written explanation of its position and inform you of your right to appeal its decision.
- * Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.
